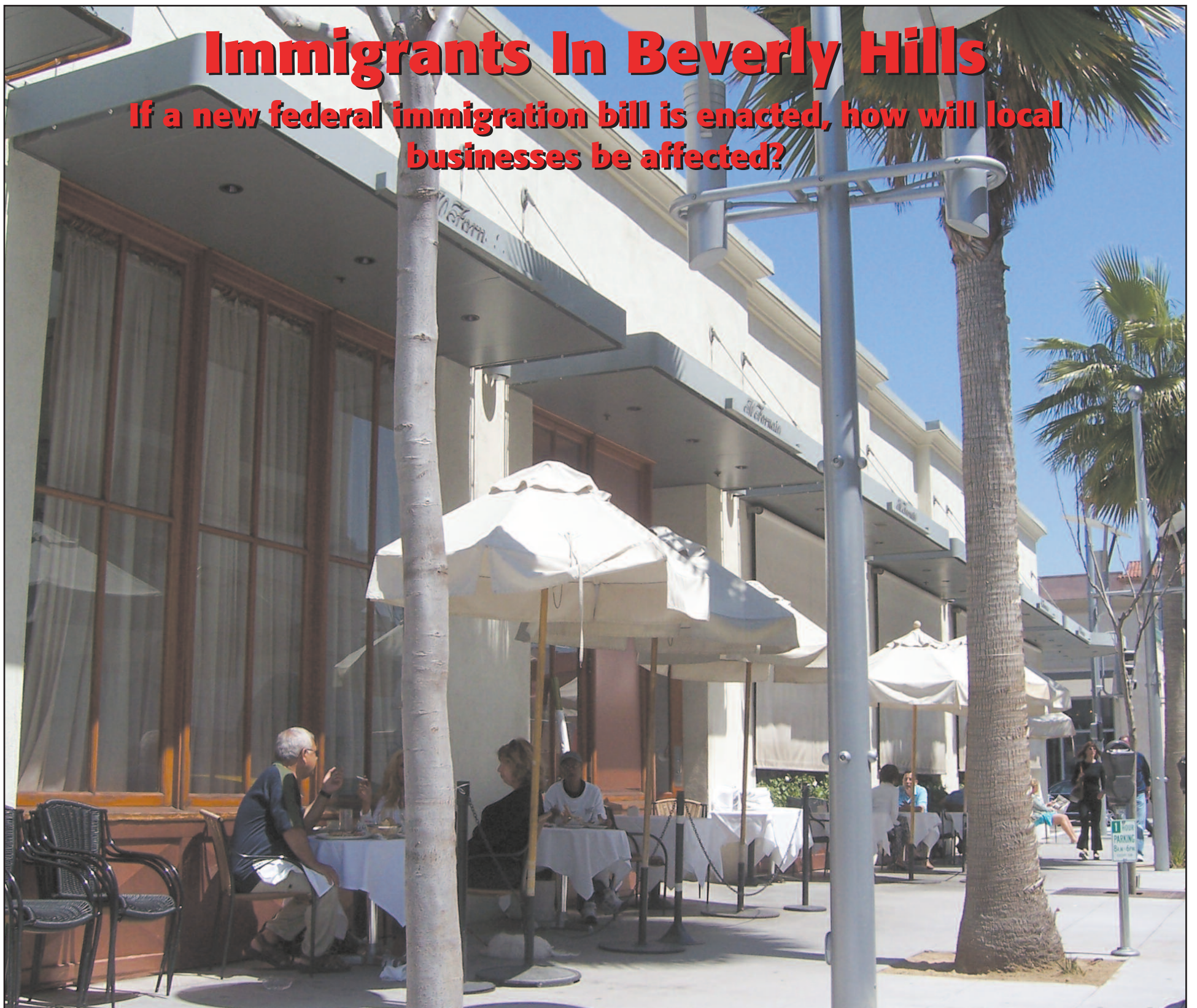

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Neighborhood Watch Keeps An Eye On Disaster Training

The Beverly Hills Police Department is actively recruiting residents as part of its effort to revitalize the city's neighborhood watch program.

The Beverly Hills Police Department, in collaboration with the city council, is in the process of revamping the city's neighborhood watch program to prepare residents for the possibility of a major disaster.

The Beverly Hills neighborhood watch program has been in formal existence since 1994, according to officials in the Beverly Hills Police Department Crime Prevention Bureau. Traditionally, the program has been aimed at preventing local crimes such as burglaries by providing an organized system for spotting and reporting suspicious activity.

Now, in the wake of 9/11 and Hurricane Katrina, the city is stepping up efforts to revitalize and expand the program to include disaster preparedness.

"We really want to have a rededication to



preparedness," said Officer Kurt Haefs of the Crime Prevention Bureau. "The old neighborhood watch was about looking out for your neighbor, knowing who lives where and what cars belong there. It was about familiarizing yourself with everybody on your block and looking out for one other. But now, with the threat of terrorism and different disasters, it's also gone into disaster preparedness."

The first step in expanding the program, according to Haefs, is recruiting new block captains. "The city has turned over," said Haefs. "A lot of the old block captains have passed on or are older and ready to pass the torch."

The role of block captain has always included organizational duties such as contacting new residents about the program, coordinating

NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING AND AVAILABILITY OF DRAFT ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT REPORT (EIR)

A Draft Environmental Impact Report (EIR) has been prepared for a proposed mixed-use project ("Project") to be located at **8600 Wilshire Boulevard**. The Draft EIR will be released on Monday, April 17, 2006 for a 45-day public review and comment period. The City of Beverly Hills encourages public comment on the Draft EIR.

The Planning Commission will hold a public hearing on the Draft EIR and the Project on April 27, 2006 at 7:00 p.m. in Commission Room A, Beverly Hills City Hall, 455 North Rexford Drive, Beverly Hills, California 90210. This hearing will focus on the Draft EIR. There will be future hearings at which the public will be invited to speak to the Project's merits and a separate notice will be mailed regarding such future hearings.



Project Description

The Applicant, Wilshire Colonial Partners LLC, has proposed to develop a three and five-story, approximately 65-foot high mixed-use (commercial and residential) project on four lots located at the southwest corner of Wilshire Boulevard and Stanley Drive. Three of these lots front on Wilshire Boulevard, and one fronts along Charleville Boulevard (see map above). The project would include:

25 condominium units;

4,774 square feet of ground-floor commercial space; and,

86 parking spaces (25 surface-level and 61 subterranean)

Access to the parking would be provided via both Stanley Drive (commercial and visitors) and Charleville Drive (residents). The three lots fronting Wilshire Boulevard are located in a commercial (C-3) zone; and the lot fronting on Charleville Boulevard is zoned R-1 (single family residential).

Current C-3 zoning does not allow a mix of commercial and residential uses; and R-1 zoning does not allow for multi-family dwelling units, both of which are requested on this site. The Project would also exceed the existing three-story/45-foot height limit and 2:1 FAR (Floor Area Ratio) allowed in the C-3 Zone and the height limits for single family dwellings in the R-1 zone. Accordingly, the Applicant has requested a zone amendment (mixed-use overlay zone), and corollary General Plan amendments to allow the residential use in a commercial zone; to change the R-1 zoning to allow multi-family dwellings; and to allow additional height and density for the entire project. The Project will also be subject to the Planning Commission's Development Plan Review and the Architectural Commission's review of the building's exterior design features. The Development Plan Review will include review of the Vesting Tentative Tract Map for the proposed condominiums as well as modifications to the required setbacks for commercial-residential transition areas.

Copies of the Draft EIR are available for public review in the Community Development Department at City Hall, 455 North Rexford Drive, Room G-40; the Office of the City Clerk (Room 190, also in City Hall); and at the Beverly Hills Public Library at 444 North Rexford Drive. One copy (per person or organization) of the Draft EIR may be obtained from the Community Development Department without charge. (Reproduction costs may be charged for additional copies.)

After analyzing the project the Environmental Impact Report found several potentially significant impacts (air quality, earth, noise, circulation/parking, utilities) but all were found to be mitigable, and with the implementation of the mitigation measures proposed in the EIR, no significant impacts are anticipated. The site is not on any of the lists of sites enumerated under Section 65962.5 of the Government Code including, but not limited to, lists of hazardous waste facilities, land designated as hazardous waste property, hazardous waste disposal sites and others, and the information in the Hazardous Waste and Substances Statement required under subdivision (f) of that Section.

The **45-day public comment period** on the Draft EIR will run from **Monday April 17, 2006, through June 1, 2006.**

Copies of all relevant material, including the project specifications and the environmental initial study are available for review in the offices of the Community Development Department of the City of Beverly Hills.

activities and distributing information.

With the newly organized program, block captains will also be responsible for keeping track of information that might come into play in the event of an emergency, such as who has participated in Community Emergency Response Training (CERT), whether anyone has special needs such as being wheelchair bound or bed-ridden and who is a physician.

"Once we recruit the amount of people we need— which is a lot— then we're going to train them," said Haefs. At training sessions the captains will be given information on how to organize their block in the event of an emergency, photo identification and paperwork so they can "go from house to house and get a list of basic information for each person on their block: address, name, phone numbers and special needs."

The ultimate goal of expanding the program, according to the Beverly Hills Emergency Management Director Pamela Mottice-Muller, is preparing neighborhoods to survive in the event that a major disaster cuts off emergency services for several days.

"We have 26 fire fighters and seven to ten police officers on shift at night," said Mottice-Muller. "People need to learn how to take care of themselves."

The city council is also contributing to the effort. They are currently drafting letters to be sent to members of the city's homeowners associations, encouraging residents to participate in neighborhood watch education programs.

"In the event of a city wide or region wide disaster all of us must be able to take care of

ourselves for at least three to five days," said Mayor Steve Webb in an email to the *Weekly*. "It is unlikely that the police or fire services will have sufficient man power to get to all of us any sooner. Expanding the responsibility of the neighborhood watch program to provide information and training as well as setting up a neighborhood network to allow for neighbors to assist each other under such circumstances is one of the most effective means of making certain we can all survive such a disaster."

In addition to recruiting new block captains, the police department is encouraging residents to participate in CERT. Under the leadership of the Beverly Hills Fire Department, CERT is a 28-hour, Federal Emergency Management Agency certified course.

CERT classes include lectures, videos, slides and interactive participation.

According to former Mayor Mark Egerman, who has participated in CERT training, "The CERT program is a remarkable experience."

"[CERT] gives hands-on training on how to handle various disasters including putting out gasoline fires and search-and-rescue following natural disasters. I used my training on an occasion when a tree limb fell on a table of people at an outdoor restaurant. CERT training enabled me to be of help in that situation and be much more effective than I would've otherwise been," Egerman said.

The police department hopes that in the next year, each city block will be represented by one or more block captains and will be prepared to organize in the event of a major disaster.

"Everybody on every block should be part of it," said Haefs.

Fifth grade teacher
Horace Mann & Beverly Vista, 1964-1988
Fallbrook, CA

How did you first get to Beverly Hills?

I was taking classes at USC for my graduate work and I met a gentleman who was a teacher at [Beverly Hills] High School. I don't remember his name, but we got acquainted and he said, 'What are you doing [teaching] in Los Angeles? Why don't you come over to Beverly Hills?' I said, 'Come on. People don't just switch over to Beverly Hills! You've got to have influence and power.' He said, 'How do you know until you try?' So I did try, and the advantage I had was that [late former Horace Mann Principal] Dave Haserot was also a fellow I went to high school with. He was one semester ahead of me at John C. Fremont in Los Angeles but I got to know him because he was a big baseball star and his father was a P.E. teacher. Dave Haserot helped me get

the position, I think.

You started as a fifth grade teacher at Horace Mann and then moved to Beverly Vista. Why did you switch schools?

I'd been teaching at Horace Mann for four years and then I was on the infamous 'OKK' team. Three of us-- Audrey Olesky, Becky Keller and I-- got together and wanted to do an open classroom environment. The three of us just got to talking and the more we talked the more we wanted to try it. Dave Haserot O.K.'d it, and for four or five years we had an un-graded kindergarten, first and second grade open structure. Some parents wanted a more structured situation, so they had two choices: they could have a regular kindergarten, first or second grade classroom, or they could come into our un-graded [classroom] where [the students] moved at their own pace. It wasn't structured so a child had to fit a

grade level; when they learned something they moved on. It was fantastic and we had a packed house. It was much harder than a regular self-contained classroom because you had to be open and not feel almighty and all-powerful. You had to learn to compromise. It worked perfectly. [Then] Audrey Olesky retired. Becky Keller decided to have children and become a stay at home mom. [Former Horace Mann Principal] Helene Feldman [interviewed in issue #328] was going to move into administration and I wasn't too excited about [Art] Fields, the new principal that was going to be there. I knew that [Fields] did not like team teaching. I transferred to Beverly Vista and I taught fifth grade the whole time I was there.

Why did you choose to teach fifth grade?

My favorite grades were second and fifth. Second because they were wide-eyed, bushy-tailed, had just learned to read and were so excited. In fifth grade they were still wide-eyed and bushy-tailed and not in the middle school yet, so they were receptive to all sorts of things and not so sophisticated to think, 'Oh, the teacher doesn't know as much as I do.' That usually happens in sixth grade.

What was the district like at the time?

It had a real small-town feel to it. Whenever we had to deal with problems, the Teachers Professional Organization had dinner with the board members and the superintendent, and after dinner we'd hash

out our concerns and problems and they were resolved. Compromise seemed to be so easy; everything worked beautifully. Then the change came. When the Teachers Professional Organization became a union, was labeled a union and used union tactics, that's when the trouble started. When [former Superintendent] Ken Peters decided to retire [in 1981] that was the big switch. With a new board and a new superintendent it was, 'You're employees and you do what we say. We're the board and how dare you suggest we work together.' It got pretty ugly. Names just don't come to me, but there were still some good board members. Before, Beverly Hills was small-town and everybody knew everybody on a positive basis. When things had to be done, they got done; there was no calling attorneys and specialists.

When we interviewed Walt Puffer last year [issue # 293], he described the Beverly Vista faculty at the time as "very close knit and very capable and dedicated." Would you agree?

Oh yes. [Puffer] was my first principal at Beverly Vista. Everybody was everybody's friend. I have no complaints about the staff. They were very professional and worked together very well. There were three of us who worked as a team teaching fifth grade and one fifth grade teacher who had her own classroom. Elaine Palazzo, who I worked with, is still at Beverly Vista. Karen Knowles was [also] part of the fifth grade team. Diane Mead—she's now in adminis-

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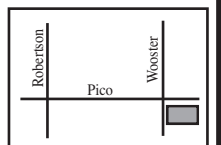

 tration—taught fifth grade [in a separate classroom]. She was great. We had a great time.

Was there a lot of interaction between teachers and parents?

One of the things about the Beverly Hills school system is so many of the parents are involved and want to have a say in what's going on. Most of the time it's very positive, but sometimes they jumped in without thinking. We had a math program [at Beverly Vista] that we in the fifth grade were very excited about. We were teaching in a more open structure and we were moving [students] flexibly from one thing to another. Then three or four vocal parents went to the principals and said 'we don't like it.' They felt that the program should be a straight out of the book. It works, there's no question, but we wanted to be a little more innovative. I guess we didn't introduce it correctly, but we learned: anytime we wanted to do a new program we got the parents involved!

Why did you decide to retire?

It was time. They say, 'Why retire if you enjoy what you're doing and get satisfaction?' and I was thinking, 'Why am I retiring?' But my wife convinced me. She said, 'Honey, I want you home.' And she was right. It was a good idea.

What are you doing now?

We moved to Fallbrook and I started substitute teaching. I did it for two years and I

learned the horrible truth: substitutes are at the bottom of the list in the educational hierarchy. It really bothered me. The provisional substitute is highly underrated and not treated well. There's no respect, certainly not from the children, the older ones. It was a game— what could they get away with, what could they pull? You had to be so shrewd and so sharp and one step ahead of them. It was no longer the game of what could you teach these kids; it was, can I keep one step ahead of them? [Laughing] I thought, this is crazy. What am I doing? Now I volunteer at the local elementary school. I'm mostly in the library, helping the librarian read stories. That's very satisfying. I volunteer at the local hospital every Wednesday morning, helping patients with menus or water or moving them in wheelchairs; I'm a gopher. And I work at a book store that raises money for the public library. That keeps me busy.

Do you like Fallbrook?

It's very nice. It still has a small town feeling to it. You go into the stores and they know you. I've moved now though. I sold my home in Fallbrook and I live in a mobile home in a little town right next to Fallbrook called Rainbow. It's really small. The population is 1,047. Downtown Rainbow is a two-pump gas station, a little bar with a coffee shop and a grocery store. Because we're so small, we don't have a post office, so my mail goes to Fallbrook.

Readers Suggest School Support

Committee formed for open house week.

And the winner is: the Beverly Hills schools. For the past few weeks we have asked readers to suggest a civic project or activity that could draw broad community support and unite our city in a common objective. Not surprisingly, the overwhelming choice was public education.

However, one letter posed an interesting problem. "Our community needs to know more about our schools." Through the years there has been a very steady decline in the number of residents who have children in our public schools; many people who live, work or do business in the city have little direct connection with the schools although almost all recognize the importance of quality education.

So, we had an idea. An Open House Week for all five of our schools to which the entire city would be invited. There are similar events for parents, but not for the community. The Open House could include examples of student work, discussions with teachers, performances by musical and the-

atre groups, open forums on education issues— the list goes on.

When we posed this idea to a few community leaders, the reaction was very positive. Of course, to make an idea into reality you need a committee, and who best to serve: People who already have a full plate of obligations. The steering committee, which will be broadened to include representatives from every organization and every community interest, includes chair **Lili Bosse**, a long time education leader, Beverly Hills Chamber of Commerce CEO **Dan Walsh**, Southwest Beverly Hills Homeowner Association president **Kenneth A. Goldman**, Planning Commissioner **Shahram Melamed**, City Manager **Rod Wood** and Beverly Hills League of Women Voters president **Dorothy Kaufman**. Hopefully Rotary, the many homeowner associations, CTR, the Bar Association and other groups will also participate.

The school board will be asked to

endorse and the support the open house program, but the idea drew a very positive response from Supt. **Jeff Hubbard**. "We could consider making this an annual event," Hubbard said.

Chamber exec Dan Walsh not only welcomed the opportunity to involve the business community, but suggested a broadening of links between the schools and the city's businesses. "What we hope to see are organized visits of students to our diverse industries," Walsh said. "A behind the scenes look at how a hotel functions, what goes into running a department store and more would not only be educational, but strengthen the ties of education to the business sector."

We are grateful to all those who had suggestions for a Unite the Community project; more on some of their ideas later. If you want to be considered for membership on the Open House Week committee or have any thoughts on how to make sure this does work, please email me.

The committee will first formulate suggestions on what should be included and how to obtain broad community involvement and then submit their plans to the school district for approval.

Some thoughts on the need for reaching out: Aside from the changing cultural diversity of our schools, there has been a demo-

graphic change that has been felt for several decades. Ken Goldman reminded me that when he led an earlier school bond campaign, the real challenge was to convince voters who did not have children in the schools how important our schools were to the whole community. Not easy when many residents no longer have kids in the schools and even more challenging when schools reach out to the business sector. Many business owners and professionals don't live here, but their tax dollars help pay the costs of public education and many, but not all, contribute to the Beverly Hills Education Foundation.

The Open House will demonstrate to the business sector, to new residents without children and others what our schools are all about. Actually seeing some of the art done by children in the elementary schools, a performance of a school play, a production of a BHEV news show, a session of a student body government, the making of the school paper and much more will, I am certain, excite all those who visit our high school and four elementary schools.

The readers who suggested a school related project are clearly right: The Open House Week could unite our city and bridge all kinds of differences that make us a unique community.

the day was not permitted. When some businesses and especially restaurants began applying for exceptions, the then city manager, **Mark Scott**, warned that visitors to the business areas would not take kindly to having metered spaces removed to be replaced by "valet parking only" signs.

Today, a large number of the city's meter spaces are gone and almost every restaurant has a valet service. One reader prompted me to examine the practices to weigh the advantages and disadvantages. The same reader also questioned whether there were any controls on the valet charges.

Last question first: There are not now any controls on how much the valet services charge. The fees seem to range from \$3 to \$7, the most expensive being the exception. The services are usually provided by independent contractors not directly controlled by the businesses. These are licensed and carefully monitored by the city.

The restaurants pay an annual fee of \$1,200 regardless of how many spaces they receive. However, they are also charged \$10 per day for every meter they replace—that is the amount the city feels it loses.

According to our source at the Transportation Department, the city is currently reviewing the fee structure. But fees alone are not the only issue. Valet parking is critical to the success of our many restaurants, and although I have no real figures to make this conclusion, I think we probably have more eateries than ever in our history. South Beverly Drive alone has seen an explosion of dining opportunities— every-

thing from fast food sandwich shops to pizza and ice cream outlets. All of this is very good for our economy.

As for traffic control, the valet services probably reduce, not increase traffic. During the day, there are no valet services on South Beverly and the constant circling of cars looking for spaces helps make that street one of the busiest in the city. When nighttime valet services are available, the traffic is far more manageable. We might want to reexamine our shuttle services, making them more available from and to our parking structures – an idea first promoted by former Mayor **Donna Ellman**.

In any case, the direct revenue losses from valets are probably a wash, but the control values are real. Some years back, we lost some fine eateries on Little Santa Monica because of access issues.

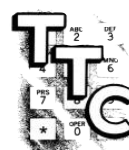
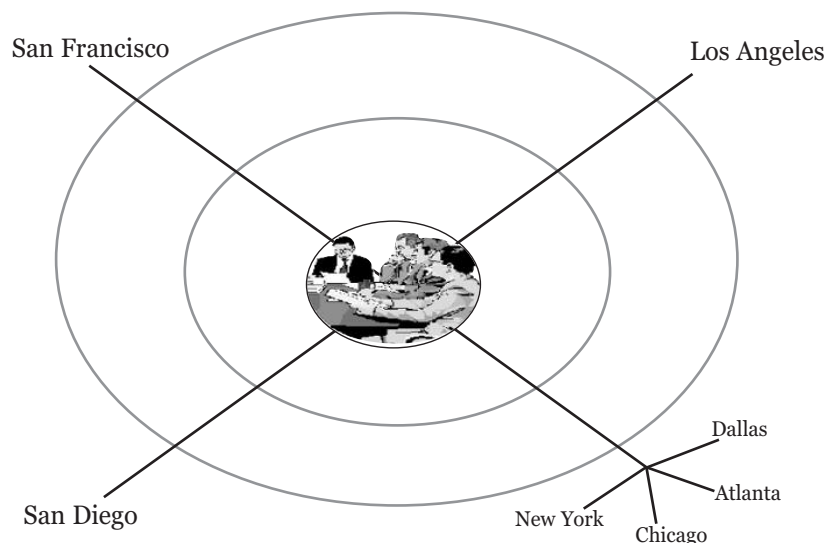

Brush Clearance Requirements May Change

City staff has submitted a recommendation to the council to modify the City's existing brush clearance ordinance; the proposed change would mean new guidelines for landscaping around homes in Beverly Hills.

The modified ordinance would require a 100 to 200 foot "fuel modification zone" around all structures to create more defensible space around homes; defensible space, once cleared of obstructions, provides a fuel break to keep fire away as long as possible-- around homes. Defensible space can be created by removing untended brush, planting fire-resistant plants, trees, shrubs or maintaining well-watered, cut grass.

Currently, the Los Angeles Fire Department requires 200 feet of vegetation clearance around properties. The proposed ordinance would provide the same level of protection provided by the LA requirement for homes in the Very High Fire Safety Hazard Severity Zone of Beverly Hills.

Staff is proposing to educate residents through homeowner classes and contractor classes this year and enforce the new ordinance in 2007.

Wasserman Donates \$6 Million To LA Schools

Casey Wasserman, 31, who attended Hawthorne school in the 1980s, made a \$6 million donation to Green Dot Public Schools in Los Angeles.

Green Dot is a non-profit organization that operates five charter high schools and is one of the leading critics of the LAUSD. The organization will combine the gift with the \$5 million it has already raised from grants and fundraising events to operate six small schools around Jefferson High school, which is one of LA's worst-performing public schools.

City Moves Forward With Its Pet Etiquette Campaign

To raise awareness of the Beverly Hills Municipal Code, Title 5, Chapter 2, which emphasizes observing pet etiquette, city staff has developed a comprehensive public campaign that increases outreach and enforcement efforts.

Since May 2005, when proactive enforcement began, the city has had a total of 36

detected violations and one repeat offender resulting in the issuance of a citation, which is a \$100 fine by mail.

In summary, the municipal code requires pet owners to keep their dogs on a controlled, durable leash no longer than six-feet in length and does not allow a person to walk more than four dogs at the same time. All dog owners are also required to clean up any mess including defecation caused by pets, with exemptions for sightless people.

Lawn signs with the slogan, "It's your Dooty. Pick it up!" will be made available to residents upon request. The education plan also

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includes a new 24-hour hotline number, (310) 285-PETS, to report violation related to dog defecation as well as unleashed or improperly leashed dogs. Staff is also considering placing bad dispensers in all city parks with dog character, slogan and violation info on front dispenser.

Congressman Waxman Raises Questions About Federal Building Site

In a letter sent last week to the General Services Administration, Congressman Henry A. Waxman of the 30th District raised questions about a February Draft Environmental Impact Statement for the proposal to expand the Los Angeles FBI Federal Building at 11000 Wilshire Blvd. in Westwood.

The concerns cited by Waxman include whether alternative sites have been identified for the proposal; an incomplete and negative traffic analysis; how FBI personnel will efficiently deploy from the site given the area's traffic ratings; how the project may impact response times for other emergency personnel and if the FBI's consolidated presence would leave residents more vulnerable to a terrorist attack. Waxman also called for GSA to provide opportunity for public comment on the proposed expansion.

In an email to the *Weekly*, Mary Filippini, public affairs officer for GSA, said GSA is currently in a 60 day public comment period which ends April 24. After that date, GSA will prepare responses to the comments made during this period, including comments offered at the public hearing held on March 14. All comments and responses will be included in a Final Environmental Impact Statement which will be published and released in the fall.

IMMIGRANTS IN BEVERLY HILLS

If a new federal immigration bill is enacted, how will local businesses be affected?

A number of proposals have been circulating in the Congress pitting Republicans against Democrats, and even Republicans against Republicans, in an effort to reform current immigration laws, with Judiciary Committee Chairman James Sensenbrenner's (R-Wisc.) bill at the forefront comprised of the strictest punishments and with no guest worker plan in place.

But as thousands protest in the streets of Southern California and across the nation in reaction to the proposed legislation, the Beverly Hills hotel and restaurant businesses are also staking their claim on the controversial issue.

"I'm very pleased with the protests and the direction that it's heading in regards to being defeated," said Porta Via restaurant owner Peter Garland. "It sounds like now it's swaying the other way and people are realizing that this is a wrong way of approaching [immigration]."

With an increasing immigrant workforce, restaurants and hotels, as well its consumers, may experience a staggering effect in prices if tougher immigration laws are passed.

"Restaurant owners work on a very small profit margin— about 3 to 5 percent. It's really hard to tell speculating how much of the workforce is undocumented but it could lead to closures, cutting down shifts or not growing anymore and opening up new restaurants because of the workforce that wouldn't be there," said California Restaurants' Association (CRA) spokesperson Jordan Traverso.

Because no studies have been made regarding the number of undocumented workers in Beverly Hills, the exact impact on industries like restaurants and hotels is unknown.

"I think that any change in the immigration policy could have economic impact effects across our economy. How one can predict how that will be is the work of the Congress today and I can't say exactly how it would affect Beverly Hills," said Beverly Hills Chamber of Commerce CEO Dan Walsh. "That's part of the dilemma here— there's a great deal that is speculated upon and thought to be known, but in fact, nobody really does know except the employer or [the immigrants] themselves."

As of this article, the Chamber has not taken a stance for or against the immigration proposals.

GOP senators also worked in a closed session earlier this month in an effort to compromise on a bill. As of now, the results of those sessions are indefinite.

The strictness of enforcement and punish-

ment varies amongst the proposed bills. Sensenbrenner's bill, if passed, would make it so that employers who failed to comply with the implemented electronic verification system would be fined up to \$7,000 per vio-

lation for a first offense and as high as \$40,000 the third time an employer was caught hiring illegal immigrants.

IRS doesn't believe that you did your best to confirm whether or not they were here legally. We pay a horrible price."

"Immigration has to address the underlying problem, which is the broken immigra-

tion system," Traverso said. "There has to be a way of doing it so that there's no liability on a business owner when an undocumented person proves to be such. Those things we hope are going to be addressed."

Aside from direct labor impact at hotels and restaurants, lack of farm hands may also be an issue. Restaurant owners, like Garland, may be forced to not only pay higher wages for their workers, but may have to indirectly pay higher prices for their food too.

"At Porta Via I buy most of my produce organic and from local farmers," Garland

said. "I go to Santa Monica Farmer's Market on a weekly basis and I work with all the local farmers and most of the people working on the farms are here from a different country trying to get legal status. I know that the cost of produce has been going up over that last few years in particular because of the lack of laborers that farmers have. They have crops that are just going to die in the earth because they just don't have the laborers to pick the crops. So that's not only a waste of food but ultimately our prices are affected because there may be a shortage."

The state of California, specifically, with a high number of immigrant population, hires immigrants at every level of its workforce— from manager to back of the house workers— more than any other state, according to the CRA. This would mean that California workers and businesses would be affected the most.

"We know that it would be a huge deficit to our industry to just automatically assume that everyone's just going to disappear like 'A Day Without A Mexican' style. That would be a big hit because undocumented and documented immigrants are fundamental to the success of the restaurant industry, as business owners, as entrepreneurs, as customers, as workers— as everything," Traverso said.

"Our company supports the position that the California Restaurant Association takes," said Brian Monfort, vice president of operations at Lawry's Prime Rib restaurant in Beverly Hills. "We want to look for an amicable resolution because clearly, the Hispanic population is very important to our industry."

Overall, if a bill passed and immigration enforcement got stricter, the number immigrant workers would decrease, leaving business owners and consumers facing higher prices for goods and services.

"I don't think Beverly Hills is any different than any place else," Abrams said. "No matter how well the hotels in Beverly Hills or anywhere in Southern California try to screen out those who are not entitled to work here legally, they're going to find people who are here illegally. So if the result of immigration reform is what has appeared so far, which is to somehow find all 12 million illegal immigrants, of which some 7 million are working in this country and round them up and send them home— it would have a devastating effect to the hospitality industry in Southern California. Beverly Hills would be no different than Los Angeles or San Diego."

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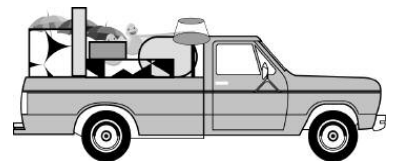
