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

Hawthorne Principal Promoted to HR position

Alexander Cherniss, principal of Hawthorne School, will become Director of Human Resources starting July 1, according to the BHUSD's Certificated Personnel Report.

Cherniss was approved by the Board of Education at its meeting Tuesday.

"The Director of Human Resources position, at its core, is about building and maintaining positive relationships with people," Cherniss said. "The thing I cherish most in working in the BHUSD is the relationships I have built with staff, students and community members, so I think that this is a perfect fit for me."

He said the Hawthorne School community as a whole will be able to provide input in the hiring of his replacement. Next week an open forum will be held for parents to share their opinions with district personnel on what characteristics they would like to see in a new principal, he said. Staff will have a similar opportunity.

"I am confident we will get a strong candidate to continue to lead Hawthorne School in a positive direction," he said.

Cherniss is Hawthorne's fifth principal in 10 years. He said he feels fortunate for having the opportunity to work with the educators and students he has during his five years at Hawthorne.

"I will continue to be an educator and keep the focus on providing the best possible education for the students of Beverly Hills," Cherniss said.

Goldberg clarifies LA Times comment

Board of Education member Brian Goldberg apologized Tuesday at the board meeting for a comment printed in the Los Angeles Times May 16 in a story about the legacy permit program. The Times quoted him as saying "What's wrong with being elitist? We're Beverly Hills."

Board Vice President Myra Lurie said board members need to be careful when making public comments and speaking with the media. Lurie said if not careful, these comments

could be perceived as the board's collective opinion, not the individual's.

However, Goldberg said it was clear who was speaking in the quote.

"No one misunderstood who the quote was from," Goldberg said. "It was clear I wasn't representing the board."

Goldberg said the quote was taken out of context, but he takes full responsibility for it. He said he and the LA Times reporter were discussing the city's elite fire and police department, as well as its elite dining, shopping and hotels. The quoted material came at the end of the discussion.

"It's a teaching moment that things can be taken out of context," Goldberg said. "We need to be very careful when we're taking bits and pieces of quotes out of context."

He said Lurie's comments were a personal attack that did not need to be vocalized during a public meeting. Goldberg said he did not want to deter his colleagues from voicing their opinions, but he would have handled it differently.

"If I had an issue with one of my colleagues I would have spoken with them privately and not brought it out and publicly embarrassed them," he said.

Goldberg and Lurie said they spoke earlier in the day. Lurie said she had told him what she was preparing to say at the meeting.

People of Beverly Hills work very hard to demonstrate they are not part of the elite, stuck-up, negative stereotype so many people have placed them in, she said.

"My intention was not to embarrass him," Lurie said. "My intention was to set the record straight."

Beverly Hills announces irrigation restrictions

The Beverly Hills City Council declared a Stage B Emergency Water

Conservation Ordinance, according to a press release Wednesday. The ordinance calls for a citywide, mandatory reduction of 10 percent of portable water use, which will take effect July 1.

To meet these restrictions the city will implement a water schedule that bans irrigation, such as lawn watering, from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. daily. Additionally, the north zone of the city will be allowed to

water Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays; the south zone of Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays. No watering will be allowed Sundays.

The ordinance follows Governor Arnold Schwarzenegger's declaration of a statewide drought. For more information about the ordinance, visit <http://www.beverlyhills.org/waterconservation>.

And Election Reactions

Eli Broad's proposal to create a museum that would house part of his highly prized art collection in Beverly Hills will probably not happen according to city hall sources.

As first reported here last November, Broad had entered into a tentative agreement with owners of the property at Wilshire and Little Santa Monica Boulevard, now the site of a Starbucks but formerly an historic Beverly Hills landmark, Wilson's House of Suede, for a museum and office space.

Broad, long a leading figure in the art, education and philanthropic communities, was a founding partner in the home building firm of Kaufman and Broad.

Our sources have said the museum concept, at first warmly welcomed by city officials, hit an insurmountable problem when Broad's representatives informed the city the project would probably not go forward unless Beverly Hills paid for some of the ancillary costs, including a

parking facility.

Considering the current budget crisis now facing the city and the uncertainty of the Broad plans, this new wrinkle in the negotiations could mean an end to the project despite reports that Broad had gone to considerable expense in retaining a leading architectural firm to prepare plans and designs for a museum.

There is no question that Broad has an art collection of outstanding value. He has been involved in negotiations to house the works in many other venues, including the Los Angeles County Museum of Art. Originally, some skeptics in the art world thought Broad was using Beverly Hills as a bargaining chip with LACMA, but his retention of architects and a former mayor/lawyer (**Tom Levyn**) as a lobbyist for the project seemed to prove that Broad was serious about his plans.

However, Beverly Hills officials have told us that the request for city financial involvement is not on the table and that

Broad is now likely to withdraw his plans.

Actually, the question that still had to be considered, even if Broad continued, was whether the Wilshire – Santa Monica site was really appropriate for an art museum.

There are actually three owners of property who together and separately have been in the process of attempting to obtain a zone change for what used to be the rail road right of way and zoned T for Transportation. Clearly, finding some low density use for this ugly eye sore has been on the city's wish list for many years. Although no specific plans can be submitted until the zone change process is concluded, the Broad proposal put other plans on hold. (If the unused property is developed, even without Broad, it would also lead to likely upgrading of existing uses on Little Santa Monica.)

But back to a museum use. Even if a Broad art museum was Getty-like with advance reservation restrictions, that corner is probably the least attractive choice considering both traffic and neighborhood impacts and would have the least direct economic benefits for the city. Yes, a Broad collection museum would be a great addition to our city, but for his and the city's best interests, some other site, in fact almost any other, would be more welcome.

(Consider what an art museum could do for the Entertainment District, the former Industrial Area, as one example.)

All of this now seems to be very academic. Broad has made enormous and successful ventures into business, education and the art world and his family philanthropies are legendary, however, he has also been in and out of many aborted plans including purchasing the Tribune Company, owners of the Los Angeles Times, and schemes to bring an NFL franchise to Los Angeles .

Now, the city needs to expeditiously move forward on dealing with the rail road property, and, at least for now, the Starbucks at the intersection is safe.

department, Karns has also earned the respect of both city officials and city staff. He will be missed, but we wish him well as he begins his new career.

By the time you read this, the city council may have made some decision on the appeal to continue funding of the CPR program. We wrote last week about the hundreds of people whose lives were probably saved because of this citizen emergency training program, but a letter from the American Heart Association might well help the city reconsider financing the volunteer group.

A letter signed by **Karen A. Wentworth**, regional manager of the American Heart Association, warns the city council that if the program is suspended, it could take two years for it to be reinstated.

Clearly, many vital services at all levels of government face deep cuts, but hopefully this life saving program that has seen thousands of people trained for emergency assistance can and will be spared.

Cathy Baker, one of the pillars of our education community, recently represented our PTA at the group's state convention in San Jose.

The state education association had an almost crisis agenda in finding ways to support public education at the state level. PTA leaders were given training in how to communicate with state legislators and with community members in the face of the severe cuts being considered for all state schools.

Cathy is legislative chair for the Beverly Hills PTA and was the only delegate from our district to attend the convention. On a personal note, Cathy was a key volunteer leader in the successful Measure E bond election I coordinated for the district. Her calm, highly organized work was a major reason for our success. Never could have done it without her.

Somewhere in the depths of the right wing think tanks there has evolved a perception that California is a hopeless cause: GOP Presidential candidates should not waste money or time in our state and they have not only made us a permanent "blue" state, but we are labeled "the Left Coast."

As a liberal Democrat, I could only wish that were true. Yes, we have two Democratic United States Senators and, yes, **Barack Obama** easily won our electoral votes, but that is hardly the whole story.

Last week's devastating defeat of all the tax oriented ballot measures is only one example of our current political climate. The most troubling question is why so few people voted on so vital an issue? Is California really ready to scrap public education, even before the November bal-

Bad news for Beverly Hills, but good for Ashland , Oregon . Among his many contributions to the city and the department was his involvement in the department's urban search and rescue program and for developing the concept of the USAR vehicle the department purchased four years ago.

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lot rout rated one of the worst in the nation in terms of funding?

Are we really so angry at government that we are willing to endanger public safety, cut basic health care services to the most needy and curtail fundamental support for state and local schools?

Left Coast? In recent years, the voters passed a state constitutional amendment banning same sex marriage, recalled a Democratic governor who could not pass a state budget – sound familiar – and not too long ago recalled state Supreme Court justices who had ruled against the death penalty.

As for Beverly Hills, here too there has been a very dramatic political shift.

The only pause in the assumption that we have become less supportive of education and social legislation is the voter turnout. It may be hard to quantify voter trends in absolutes when the turn out is well under 20 percent, but it is worth study.

Compare November's vote on the ballot measures with what happened here when the Jarvis (Prop.13) property tax revolution swept the state. Jarvis forever changed how schools are funded. City's lost control of the property tax, which had been drastically cut by Prop.13, and came to depend almost entirely on the state for school support.

True, property tax reform was needed, but the draconian cuts of Jarvis were not only regressive, they were designed to punish state and local governments. However, Beverly Hills in 1978 did not join the overwhelming vote for Jarvis in most of the rest of California; our voters were far more independent and cautious.

This year, on almost every ballot measure, Beverly Hills voted NO. The typical vote on the measures was the same: 1-A

lost by 2,077 to 1,254. (Total eligible voters: About 21,000.)

On the punitive pay ballot issue, again Beverly Hills voted the same as the rest of the state and even more so: 2,391 yes to 926 no. (This impacted pay raises for legislators.)

The dichotomy of this vote is curious. In the next state election, despite the blast voters sent state government and our state legislators, almost all of them will be reelected.

This is especially true of our own very able and dedicated state assemblymember Mike Feuer. Feuer is passionate in support of public education, public safety and a humanistic approach to social needs.

The real problems in California, once dubbed "The Great Exception" by **Carey McWilliams** a leading writer in the post war era, is constitutional reform.

My colleague on another newspaper blesses the resistance to passing a budget by a Republican minority and damns those few in the state GOP who actually had the political courage to vote their conscience.

But our schools, our basic public safety programs – police and fire, and aid for our most needy are being held hostage by a stone age political system.

It is time, and it is being put together, to hold a state constitutional convention, that will change the state constitution to permit a majority vote on the budget, to ensure support for our schools and our first responders and, just possibly, take a more reasoned approach on term limits.

Now, our first priority is to keep state government from raiding our city for a diversion of our tax collars to save the state. If the legislature can't do its job with responsible tax increases to save, not only our schools, but our whole economy,

city services should not be the victims.

Speaking of the economy, if you want to help assure funding for schools, fire and police, make sure you dine at Nate 'n Al's. Of course, not at our favorite deli alone, but it's a start.

Yes, your shopping and dining habits can make a difference, one shopper at a time. While the city is considering the dismantling of the Chamber of Commerce through a separation of the Chamber from the Visitor's and Conference Bureau, a separation that has never been justified in any real sense, there is also a very bad misconception of who shops and visits our city.

Our economy, and our hotels, restaurants and stores are far more dependent on customers from our own state and neighboring cities than China, as one example of our misguided marketing expenditure.

What we need is a marketing program that begins with convincing our own residents to shop locally, not only because of our outstanding retailers, but because that keeps tax dollars at home, when it is most needed

We have some of the world's leading restaurants right here in Beverly Hills. Several of the best Italian eateries run by the Drago family, the world class Spago and The Grill, many of the best steak houses such as Ruth's, Cut and Mastro (if you can handle the noise) and celebrity magnets such as Mr. Chow and restaurants in all our leading hotels.

We have the finest hotel for events in America at the Beverly Hilton, the elegance of dining at both the Peninsula and exciting new Montage, so encourage use of these resources for yourself, friends and equally important, your visitors. Every guest you encourage to stay at one of our hotels helps fund our schools and our city.

As for marketing, we know the excitement of Rodeo Drive and its world wide reputation, we appreciate the presence of leading department stores such as Saks, Neiman Marcus and Barney's New York on Wilshire, but we now must develop a marketing program that helps the retailers on South Beverly, Little Santa Monica, Bedford, Camden, North Beverly and Robertson Boulevard, to mention some who merit our patronage and the rest of our shopping areas.

Put simply, the city needs to market our own stores, restaurants and hotels to our own residents. That should be the first priority of any economic development program. More residents need to know about our own great services. Advertising in this community newspaper would also help, he added without blushing.

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Norman Boys' Tennis Team Edged In Southern Section Semifinals

The Beverly High boys' team lost two doubles sets by two games and two others by one service break in a 10-8 loss to top-seeded Brentwood in a Southern Section Division II semifinal Tuesday at Beverly High, but were satisfied with their performance, coach Mike Margolin said.

"They knew walking off they left it all out on the courts," Margolin said. "There were no regrets."

The Normans lost to the Eagles, 12-6, in their second match of the season March 9. The differences in the rematch included Brentwood's Walker Kehrer missing the match and Beverly Hills winning two of three sets in tiebreakers from D.J. McCall, who replaced Kehrer at No. 1 singles Tuesday after not playing in the first match.

"We just tried to prepare by thinking, 'We're not the same team we were when we lost to them. We're a little bit better,'" Margolin said. "It's just going [to be a matter] of how hard we compete."

The Normans won one more singles set and one more doubles set in the rematch.

Beverly Hills trailed 4-2 in the first round, getting a 7-6 (5) victory from Daniel Ho over McCall at No. 1 singles and a 6-0 victory from Gary Parizher over Cliff Zimmerman at No. 2 singles. The Normans' No. 2 doubles team of Ben Haber and Andre Herd lost to Chris Lord and Nicki Neisser, 7-5.

Both teams won three sets in the second round. Ho defeated Victor Wu, Brentwood's No. 3 singles player, 6-1, Parizher defeated McCall, 7-6 (4), and Sam Farzani, Beverly Hills No. 3 singles player, defeated Zimmerman, 6-3. The Haber-Herd doubles team lost to the Eagles' No. 1 duo of Jackson Isaacs and Danny Sharon, 6-4.

Both teams also won three sets in the third and final round. Ho defeated Zimmerman, 6-2, Parizher defeated Wu, 6-2, and the Normans' No. 1 doubles team of James Ephrati and Jonathan Jason defeated Lord and Neisser, 7-5.



The Weekly's exclusive interview with The Peninsula Hotel Managing Director Offer Nissenbaum

Tell us about how you got to Beverly Hills.

The last 10 years I was in New York City, two positions ago I was the resident manager of The Plaza Hotel. I came here from a company called Omni Hotels, where I was the regional vice president for the north east, responsible for eight properties.

In addition, I ran their international division. And then the opportunity came to me to join Peninsula Hotels, and I thought about the quality of life for my family and I thought it would be great for them to move from living in a hotel in New York to a house in Beverly Hills, we've been in Beverly Hills for about a year and a half.

What attracted you to come to Beverly Hills?

First and foremost, I was attracted to the Peninsula. It's a phenomenal company that represents quality. It represents the philosophies and the way you should run a hotel. I believe they care about people and the long term brand quality. They're solid people.

Coming from Manhattan, to an environment with great weather, a smaller town, a quality of life where you get more space and more outdoors, was very attractive.

How is Beverly Hills different from New York?

New York is such a vast city and so fast

paced. Here, it's a smaller town, and it's a nice change. It's different. And for children, Beverly Hills is a better environment.

Tell us about your family.

I have a 12-year-old boy, Ari, a 10-year-old daughter, Giselle, and Eli is 4-years-old. I give my wife Bonnie a lot of credit; she is a very supportive wife and a great mother. She has her own company for PR and marketing.

What are the current trends for hotels?

We're obviously in a challenging time. What really we're focusing on is trading value for the guest. Not necessarily lowering rates, but trading value for our guests and making sure that they get what they spend, and have a great experience. That's really our main focus, we are working on creating a better experience for our guests especially innovation and the way we deliver our service.

Like making the guest feel like they're the most important thing in the world. That's what you can do during these times. The tendency for everyone is to drop their rates and compete. But we have a long term view, and that's about creating a "WOW" for our guests. We have a lot of great hotels here in Beverly Hills and we have to differentiate ourselves to make us successful.

Could you describe your current hotel occupancy? What types of guests are staying at The Peninsula?

The origin of the guests has remained steadfast. It's fairly the same as it was before. Some business, some leisure, some international. Occupancy has dropped as compared year over year. The good news is we've been able to maintain our rates, which is very unique.

You mentioned creating value for your guests; could you give us an example of what you mean?

The arrival experience of our guest, for example, before they're placed into their

car from the airport to the hotel, they're asked for their choice of welcome beverage and it awaits them when they get here. We have a menu in the car so they can pre-order a meal.

We've created room service where it's like a restaurant. We bring the food in courses so it stays fresh and hot and we pour the wine from the bottle right there in the room. We've created a personal sense in the guestrooms. We ask them what their favorite scent is for example. We've upgraded our pet menu, created a great experience for pets and children. We're looking at all aspects of the operation, and do all the little things that create a great experience.

Are there any changes coming to the hotel?

We've done a few model rooms and suites in the hotel. We're experimenting with it to come up with the next prototype to see what the next room will be. Our plan right now is to start our room upgrades, or a little face-lift to our room product in the fall. We're going to keep to who we are, but just renew it.

What's new at the hotel?

Our weekend barbeque on the roof garden is a lot of fun. It's been really well received. Thursdays we have cocktail hour on the roof garden bar. Half off cocktails, we're trying to create a fun atmosphere. We've revamped the Belvedere Menu, it's more affordable, and we're making pizzas in house, and including dim-sum as a choice for guests.

Is there any bad-blood between The Peninsula and The Montage after the 2005 election?

Not at all. Each hotel has their own market and their own clientele. We're all different and create different experiences. We wish them well, and hope everything goes well with them and hope the market comes back like it was in past years.

For those who have never been to The Peninsula, what would you describe as

the hotel's target audience?

It's a timeless experience; I think that's the best way to describe it. It's not the latest fad, people of all ages can come. We have families that come in, we have professionals and it's really for everyone and for people who look for a great experience and comfort.

What do you see for the future of The Peninsula in Beverly Hills?

The Peninsula is an incredible brand. It's known all over the world, it represents quality and experience. What I wish for now, is for the economy to come back, and for the flu to go away. I hope for all of the hotels in Beverly Hills to once again enjoy the business that they have in the past.

We noticed you are a member of the recently formed Budget Review Committee, what is that like?

It has certainly been a great experience. It has made me understand the city better and where the City spends its money and where the challenges are. I have a much better understanding of the challenges we have in this economic environment.

I think what they are doing is right. They're taking citizens who are not as close to the day-to-day operations in Beverly Hills. We're looking at the situation as citizens and looking at what we can do to help.

What other organizations in Beverly Hills that you are a part of?

I'm a very big believer in contributing back to the city that I live in and participating in city. I sit on the board of the Chamber. I'm the treasurer of the Convention and Visitor's Bureau, and I am on the board of the Maple Counseling Center. I am on the advisory board for the UCLA Extension for the hospitality division. I've always been very active in the community. I also belong to Rotary. It's more like a labor of love. I really believe in it. I believe being involved in the community is a role that I should have.

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
