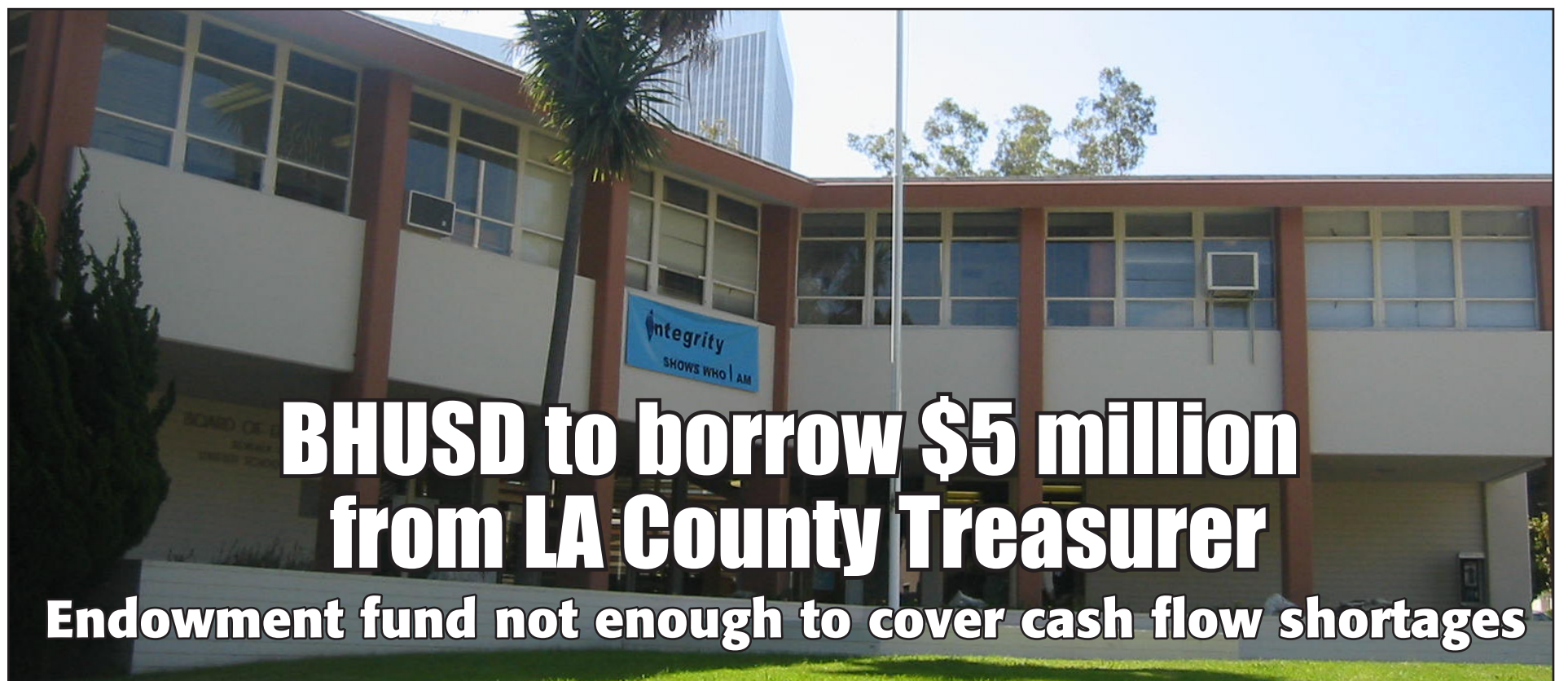

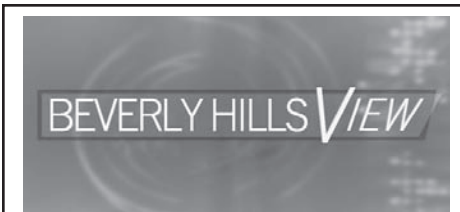

Board of Education to try to recoup \$128,000 from EBI; Safety officer vehicles repossessed on campus

The BHUSD is seeking to recover approximately \$128,000 from the campus security organization Evidence Based Inc. for services not rendered after their termination.

EBI's contract was to include a total payment of \$881,423. In October, Board of Education President Noah Margo went before the City Council to request that the city cover half of the cost. The City Council approved with a 4-1 vote, with Councilmember Willie Brien dissenting, to cover half of EBI's cost to the district for the 2014-2015 school year, which would have been \$440,712.

"The school board found a contract with this firm and then approached us afterwards," Councilmember Nancy Krasne said at the October 21 study session. "I am going to approve it this year but I'm not supporting this in subsequent years."

BHUSD Superintendent Gary Woods said that there were three installation payments in the contract. One pre-paid payment covered services until the end of December. Since EBI's services were

terminated on November 5, the district is seeking to recover the cost for the rest of the services not performed.

“We are going to consider all of our options [to retrieve the cost],” Woods said. “[EBI] is going to have to go through bankruptcy, so it’s going to be connected to whatever they’re doing on their end.”

All safety officer vehicles were repossessed on all BHUSD campuses shortly after EBI’s termination. Each vehicle was owned by EBI and leased to the district at \$10,000 per vehicle per year, which

includes insurance, fuel and maintenance costs.

BHUSD has posted a request for qualifications and proposal for campus security services, according to Woods.

“We’re going to post the invitation for those to come forward and suggest to us what they could provide and at that time the Board will consider options,” Woods said.

BHPD field training and beat officers have been providing campus safety services since November 6.

“I am thoroughly confident that BHPD is providing the security we need,” Woods said. “We are a priority to them. They made it very clear to me that the safety of our schools, the safety of our students and

staff is a priority for BHPD and they have a clear plan in place right now.”

Former Beverly Hills mail room worker Partida pleads guilty

Former Beverly Hills mail room worker Eduardo Partida pled guilty to making a false statement on his 2009 tax return.

While working for Ikon Office Solutions between 2005 – 2009, Partida was assigned to work at the Hilton Worldwide business office in Beverly Hills, according to a press release. He would order office supplies, handle shipping and receiving, fix office machines, and perform other office duties.

In November 2005, Partida took toner cartridges from the Hilton office to sell for a personal profit. Partida used the money he gained from the cartridges to pay for personal and family expenses, according to the press release.

Partida admitted that he received approximately \$240,990 in unreported income from 2005 – 2009, which is a tax loss to the government in the amount of \$49,000. Partida pled guilty to one count of unreported income for the 2009 tax year of approximately \$14,600 and a tax loss of \$2,235.

Partida is scheduled to be sentenced on February 23, with a possible maximum sentence of three years in federal prison and a fine of \$250,000. He may also be ordered to pay restitution to the government.

Winning all nine singles sets was enough to carry Beverly High to the victory in its Southern Section Division 2 quarterfinal against Martin Luther King High School Nov. 10 at Beverly High.

The set score was tied 9-9, as the Wolves won all nine doubles sets, but the Normans won on games, 70-64.

Martina Bocchi, playing No. 1 singles for Beverly Hills, won 6-0, 6-1, 6-1. Katrina Stefanovic, the Normans' No. 2 singles player, won 6-1, 6-2, 6-0. Lola Gorbacheva, Beverly Hills No. 3 singles player, won 6-0, 7-5, 6-0.

Beverly Hills 10, Temecula Valley 8

Bocchi won all three of her sets and Stefanovic and Gorbacheva both won two of three in a Division 2 second-round playoff match Nov. 7 at Temecula Valley.

The Norman doubles teams of Jackie Hauser and Sabrina Saitta, Nikole Okham and Sasha Treivush and Justine Elitzur and Dominique Petrie each won one set.

Beverly Hills led 4-2 at the end of the first round and 7-5 at the end of the second.

Bocchi won 7-5, 6-0, 6-0. Stefanovic won her first two sets, 6-3, 6-0, and lost 6-2 in the third round. Gorbacheva won 6-0 in the first round and 6-3 in the third and lost 6-0 in the second.

Both losses came to freshman Lindsey Gelinas, the Golden Bears' No. 1 singles player.

Beverly Hills 11, West Ranch 7

Bocchi won all three of her sets and Stefanovic and Gorbacheva both won two of three in a Division 2 first-round playoff match Nov. 5 at Beverly High.

The Normans No. 1 doubles team of Hauser and Saitta won its sets 7-5, 6-2 before being replaced by substitutes. The Sung Min Kim-Treivush and Elitzur-Petrie doubles teams both won one set.

Beverly Hills led 4-2 at the end of the first round and 8-4 at the end of the second.

Bocchi won 6-1, 6-1, 6-0. Both of Stefanovic and Gorbacheva's victories were 6-0 after 6-1 losses to sophomore Quintera Walterze, the Wildcats' No. 1 singles player.

Football

Culver City 41, Beverly Hills 12

Beverly High coach Charlie Stansbury

said he told his players at halftime of the Nov. 7 game against Culver City that if they could stop the Centaurs on three plays on the first series of the second half, their offense would be in a position to tie the score on the ensuing possession.

The Norman defense did force the Centaurs to punt after three plays. When Tony Caiseros' punt hit the ground, screams of "Peter," the signal to stay away from the ball, rang out from the Beverly Hills sideline.

However, Norman returner P.J. Goolsby touched the ball, Culver City recovered and scored a touchdown three plays later and went on to a 41-12 victory at Nickoll Field in the season finale for both teams.

Goolsby said the loudness of the crowd kept him from hearing his coaches and that he got "caught up" in the lights and noise.

Stansbury said he has told his players once a punt hits the ground not to try to field it.

Stansbury called the play "a big momentum shift."

The loss extended Beverly Hills' winless streak against the Centaurs to 12 games. The streak that began in 2002 includes two ties.

The loss was the Normans' seventh straight since their lone victory of 2014, the 19th in Stansbury's 20 games as coach and 37th in their last 42 games dating back to 2010, both their last winning season and the last time they qualified for the Southern Section playoffs.

The loss was Beverly Hills' 11th in a row in Ocean League play, dating back to 2012.

The Normans have allowed at least 40 points in 18 of Stansbury's 20 games as coach, with both exceptions coming against San Gabriel, the only team Beverly Hills has defeated with Stansbury as coach.

The game had a bright beginning for the Normans. Goolsby returned the opening kickoff 49 yards to the 50-yard line and Beverly Hills scored nine plays later on Rashad Ysaquirre's one-yard run.

The Normans (1-9, 0-5 in league play) did not score again until there were five minutes, 41 seconds remaining in the fourth quarter on Jake Wolken's 15-yard touchdown pass to Michael Massie.

Culver City (2-8, 2-3) scored all 13 points of the second quarter to take a 13-6 halftime lead on Caiseros' 49- and

41-yard field goals that were sandwiched around Anthony Polk's 49-yard touchdown pass to Justin Mayweather.

Fred Poindexter ran 33 yards for the second half's first touchdown. Donovan Davis ran 20 and 40 yards for touchdowns in the third and fourth quarters, increasing the Centaurs' lead to 34-6.

Davis ran one yard with 5:20 left for the game's final touchdown.

"We had a couple of mental mistakes that really hurt our momentum," said Wolken, who completed eight of 17 passes for 82 yards and one touchdown and had one pass intercepted on a night his team was out-gained 296 yards to 213.

"We didn't bring it like we should have. If we played the way we did in the first quarter the whole game, that would have been ours."

Stansbury said Culver City's advantageous field position led to the loss. The Centaurs' touchdown drives were 48, 29, 50, 44 and 54 yards long.

"We didn't do a good job moving the ball consistently after the first drive," Stansbury said.

A first-quarter ankle injury that sidelined Ysaquirre until the third quarter hampered Beverly Hills' offense, Stansbury said.

"He's a difference-maker when it comes to blocking and running the ball," Stansbury said.

Junior Sydney Hanover was the top Beverly Hills finisher, completing the 3-mile course in 23:11.85 to finish 10th, 3.61 seconds behind the ninth-place finisher, El Segundo junior Hannah Curran.

Santa Monica freshman Anya Sturm won in 20:40.82.

Basketball

Beverly High center Chance Comanche signed a letter of intent to accept an athletic scholarship from the University of Arizona, the university's athletic depart-

ment announced last Thursday.

"Chance has a bright future," Wildcats coach Sean Miller said in a statement released by the Arizona athletic department. "He loves the game and he plays hard."

"As he gets bigger and stronger, they sky is the limit because he already has a great feel and skill level. As somebody who can make shots, score around the basket and run the court, we love where he's going to be in his future."

Comanche also received scholarship offers from national champion Connecticut, Gonzaga, Kansas, Louisville, North Carolina State, Oklahoma State and six other Pacific-12 Conference programs - Arizona State, California, Colorado, Oregon, UCLA and USC, according to ESPN.

The 6-foot-10-inch Comanche is ranked 97th on ESPN's list of the top high school boys' basketball players in the class of 2015. He transferred to Beverly High from View Park, a charter high school in South Los Angeles, before the start of the school year.

Josh Gershon, a West Coast recruiting analyst for the recruiting website Scout.com, described Comanche in a tweet as "a mobile center who can score with back to basket or facing up."

Comanche is part of Arizona's four-player recruiting class ranked by ESPN, Scout.com and Rivals.com, another recruiting website, as the best in the nation.

The signing fulfills a nonbinding commitment Comanche announced in September. The basketball early signing period began Nov. 12.

College Basketball

Austin Mills, a 2012 Beverly High graduate, scored one point in six minutes of play in his debut with Baylor in the Bears' 80-39 season-opening victory over McNeese State Friday in Waco, Texas.

Mills made one of two free throws, did not take a shot, pulled down a defensive rebound and committed one turnover.

Mills played the first two years of his college career at Pepperdine, then transferred to Baylor earlier this year.

Because he was a non-recruited player at Pepperdine and a non-scholarship player at both Pepperdine and Baylor, Mills did not have to sit out a season like most transfers, according to Jessica Hamm, Baylor's assistant director of compliance.

BHUSD TO BORROW \$5 MILLION FROM LA COUNTY TREASURER

Endowment fund not enough to cover cash flow shortages

The BHUSD approved borrowing up to \$5 million from the LA County Treasurer School Fund on Wednesday to cover cash flow shortages after

borrowing \$7.5 million from the endowment fund.

To avoid incurring fees and interest from a Tax Revenue Anticipation Note (TRAN)

to cover for anticipated cash shortages during the school year, the BHUSD used cash from the endowment fund to cover cash flow shortages.

The district saved approximately \$30,000 in fees by borrowing money from the endowment fund to cover cash flow shortages, according to BHUSD Superintendent Gary Woods. The fund

must maintain a three percent reserve, and the full \$10 million must be restored if money is borrowed from the fund.

"It was smart, it was prudent, but it just wasn't enough," Chief Administrative Officer La Tanya Kirk-Carter said. "We are asking the county to let us borrow from them for temporary measures."

The bulk of the cash revenues for the district will come at the end of December, as well as in April.

The \$5 million short term borrowing will cover any cash shortages that the district will need to pay its employees.

"If we were a [non-basic aid] school district, we would have [approximately] 39 percent of our cash by now," Kirk-Carter said. "But being a basic aid district, we only have five percent of our cash."

Woods said that since BHUSD is the only basic aid district in LA County, cash revenues are more difficult to plan for.

"The other districts are told when they are getting their payments and how much they will be," Woods said. "They can budget [and] get them pretty close to the penny. Ours is incredibly unpredictable."

The money received at the end of December will pay back the Endowment Fund and the temporary funds borrowed from the LA County Treasurer, according to Kirk-Carter.

One main reason for the cash flow shortage is due to the recent salary increases, Kirk-Carter said. Though there is not enough cash for the months of November

and December, Kirk-Carter anticipates that there will not be another cash flow shortage for the rest of the fiscal year, unless a large unexpected expenditure is required.

"We've done our cash flow analysis [which] shows shortages only in November and December," Kirk-Carter said. "It doesn't look like we will [have a cash shortage] again."

A Board of Education meeting on November 25 is scheduled to have a budget agenda item.

"We have a positive budget and it shows [that] after the end of the fiscal year, as long as we follow the budget, we have an excess of about \$2 million," Woods said. "Everything is restored, all of [the endowment fund] is restored, all of the borrowing is restored."

The total expected cash revenue for the 2013 – 2014 fiscal year is \$52 million, and total expected expenditures are \$43 million. According to Kirk-Carter, though the district does not have the cash to cover all expenditures for November and December, by the end of the fiscal year the school would have spent within the budgeted, expected expenditures.

"What happened with a cash flow shortage is that you get ahead of yourself in your spending than what you have coming in," Kirk-Carter said. "Your budget is still going to be [the same]."

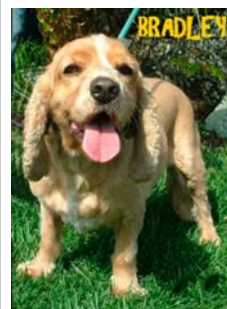
