Theater 40 and the Beverly High Performing Arts Department

An open letter to the Board of Education and the BHUSD:

I wanted to bring up a concern that many of us in the community have regarding part of the plans for our Performing Arts Department and its relationship with Theater 40.

If I'm not mistaken, there are current plans to, in some way, incorporate Theatre 40 into the Performing Arts wing of our

high school. However - and this something that must be addressed before any plans are approved - there is no formal understanding as to the sharing of certain resources (scene shop, costume area, dressing rooms, etc). In addition, I believe there are significant issues facing us when it comes to adults (non-BHHS Faculty) and students sharing the same space both during the day and - even more important - in the evenings and on weekends.

I'm not certain that our architects or contractors quite understand the realities of BHHS Performing Arts. Our teachers and students are in full production mode throughout the year. Our PA department has been jumpstarted thanks to the ambitious schedule that Dr Vincent, Ms Kikkawa and Mr Bradbury put into effect last year. It would cause significant harm to our growing department to take a step backwards and limit student production/rehearsal/performance capabilities to "make room" for the needs of Theater 40. With a full schedule of student-centric productions and events, it's difficult to imagine how one might add - or "integrate" - an outside professional production company with its own "full slate" or events.

Perhaps our architects and/or contractors have underestimated the creative ambitions and expansive performance/rehearsal/teaching that goes on in these spaces. This is not your typical LAUSD high school Performing Arts Department. The BHHS department is large, ambitious, exciting,

Hacker, Spitz sworn in; Korbato skipped over for VP slot

Newly elected Board of Education members Isabel Hacker and Mel Spitz were sworn in Tuesday night inside Beverly High's jam-packed Jon Cherney lecture hall.

Hacker was sworn in by former Board member Herb Young and Spitz by former Mayor Ed Brown.

In her first speech as a Board member, Hacker thanked her family and the Beverly Hills community before shifting to weightier topics.

"Tonight I recognize that this is no longer about a candidate or a campaign or a platform," Hacker said. "Tonight is much more important than that. Tonight is about

a new opportunity for all of us to press the reset button."

Spitz, who previously served on the Board from 1971 to 1979, was named vice president following a nomination by Board member Lisa Korbato.

Reelected in 2013, Korbato was not even considered for the vice president slot. The Board bylaws do not distinguish between concurrent or continuous terms, meaning Spitz has around three more years of seniority than Korbato.

"I pledge to promote consensus among the Board members, to enhance the educational opportunities for each and every child enrolled in our schools and to achieve financial and organizational stability," Spitz said.

Board member Noah Margo, reelected to a second term, was sworn in by Beverly Hills Drink Company Co-Founder and President Jon Gluck. Board Vice President Howard Goldstein ascended to the presidency.

Council to consider fire department pay hikes next week

A Fire Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) slated for review and approval by the City Council at next week's meeting was published on the city website December 1, in accordance with a two-week posting requirement mandated by the Labor Negotiations Ordinance.

But nobody was formally notified of the important addition, not even Vice Mayor John Mirisch.

"Nobody knew about it—there was no press release, e-blast, nothing alerting people who might be interested that it was online," Mirisch said.

The vice mayor said he alerted City Manager Mahdi Aluzri, who "didn't seem to care."

"It's frustrating and it's the opposite of transparent," Mirisch said.

student vocalists, thespians, musicians, writers, directors and filmmakers from the private schools and into BHUSD.

How do you propose that two "full time" theater companies, along with a larger orchestral and vocal music department share production space? I know that you've shared the modified ground plans with our teaching staff, but I assume that this issue may not have been tackled. There may be, I think, some political pressure to incorporate Theater 40 into the new plans, else how would one explain this as a good idea? Regardless of best intentions and even "verbal agreements," and even if it's accepted by Theater 40 that the

high school is the "primary tenant," it's important that we all openly discuss this issue. Transparency is everything. What is the real willingness of a professional theater company like Theater 40 to have the length, width and breadth of their own annual season dictated to them by our high school's needs?

That said, I don't believe that this discussion is appropriate for our teachers to have. It's our job, as BHUSD Administrators, Board of Ed members, Arts Fundraisers (both BHEF and PTSA) and interested alumni and community members to tackle the potential thorny issue now, rather than cross our fingers and hope it all works out.

Under the 107-page agreement between the city and the Beverly Hills Firefighters' Association (BHFA), the five classifications represented by the BHFA will receive pay raises over a four-year period, from October 2015 to September 2019.

The contract includes a retroactive salary increase of two percent for the ranks of firefighter, fire engineer, fire captain, fire battalion chief and fire paramedics, which was set into motion in October.

"[We] achieved a tentative agreement with the [BHFA] prior to the contract expiration," said Assistant Director of Administrative Services/HR Shelley Ovrom of the retroactive pay hike.

The 2011 – 2015 MOU expired in early October, which was after the city reached a settlement with the BHFA.

Following adoption of the memorandum, employees will earn a second pay increase of six percent.

"Classic Member" employees, those hired on or before December 31, 2012, have an employee contribution of nine percent. During the term of the 2011 – 2015 MOU, employees began paying three percent of this contribution. In the course of the current negotiations, fire employees agreed to cover the remaining six percent.

"The city is providing a salary increase to offset the additional six percent that [employees] will be paying," Ovrom said.

Salary hikes of two, two-and-a-half and three percent will then be implemented across a three-year period.

The monthly salary range for firefighters currently stands between \$7,104 and \$8,827. By September 2018, the numbers will have climbed to \$8,100 and \$10,075. The base salaries do not include overtime pay.

"I think the raises are too high," Mirisch said. "I have a problem that we basically, *briefs cont. on page 4*

without batting our eyelashes, consistently raise employee salaries at the same time that we, without batting our eyelashes, raise taxes and fees.”

Misuse and abuse of city’s EV charging program might equate to fees down the line

A city-funded program launched in 2011 that maintains and operates numerous electric vehicle (EV) charging stations might begin enforcing fees, following a rise in bad etiquette among users.

“There’s been a change in behavior and use that makes the [EV] network much less, we’ll just say, usable for its intended purpose,” said Traffic & Parking Commission Vice Chair Jake Manaster.

Currently, the city has 40 EV stations

that provide 60 parking spaces for charging. The units, located at Roxbury Park and 14 parking facilities, were funded using grants issued by ChargePoint America.

When the grant period ended in January 2014, the city stepped in so the program could continue being a free service.

But a boost in EV-station use, combined with a growing pattern of misuse, has the city reconsidering the program’s free-of-charge status.

“I came in here at [the Crescent lot at] 8:20 a.m. this morning and I couldn’t get an EV spot, and I guarantee you those same cars are still there,” Commissioner Andy Licht said last week. The issue is that users are not moving their vehicles after they are done

charging them. Currently, the average session length is around two hours and sixteen minutes.

A report drafted by Public Works Services Assistant Director Chad Lynn and Public Works Services Senior Management Analyst Caitlin Sims mentions that the changing EV culture has created a need for the city to revisit EV guidelines.

“The mission of the [EV] network needs to be decided, and that is not clear at this point,” Manaster said.

Staff is currently fine-tuning policies to govern the city’s EV program in order to balance space availability and maximize the use of the charging stations city-wide.

Key considerations include whether a time restriction should be implemented and whether the charging spaces should be reserved for electrical vehicles, meaning hybrids would not be permitted.

“The penalty should be severe for over-

staying your limit,” Licht said.

Traffic & Parking undergoes reshuffle

Traffic and Parking Commission Vice Chair Jake Manaster will replace Lester Friedman as Chair of the committee. Manaster, a former Board of Education member, has sat on the Commission since 2014.

Following recent changes to Commission operational procedures, elections are no longer part of the succession process, Transportation Deputy Director Aaron Kunz said. The rotation is now based purely on seniority.

Commissioner David Seidel, appointed in 2015, was named Vice Chair.

After serving seven years, Traffic & Parking Commissioner Jeffrey Levine bid farewell at the group’s December 3rd

Council adopts fee resolution for new historic preservation ordinance

Enactment of the city's freshly amended historic preservation ordinance is proving to be a multi-step process, as showcased by Council talks last week.

A liaison committee comprised of Vice Mayor John Mirisch, Councilmember Willie Brien, Cultural Heritage Commission Chair Lisa Greer and Commission Vice Chair Rebecca Pynoos met November 9 to discuss historic preservation application fees, which will enable the city to recover some or all of the costs associated with processing applications.

Several different applications were part of the discussion, including certificate of appropriateness, certificate of economic hardship and historic incentive permit.

According to the staff report, the liaison committee discussed the need to avoid high fees that could burden owners—

"especially those whose properties may not be eligible for designation, from taking advantage of the new Certificate of Ineligibility application."

At last Tuesday's meeting, the Council adopted a three-tier rate structure for making determinations of eligibility. Tier one, the historic property confirmation letter, provides written confirmation of a property's historic status and costs \$383.

Fee amounts were produced by analyzing staff and outside consultant hours required to review and process applications.

Priced at \$7,911, the third tier application is a full-analysis certificate of ineligibility, and "would relate to the most complicated properties, because of their size, background and complexity."

The landmark designation process costs \$19,854. But in order to encourage and incentivize voluntary landmark designations, the committee proposed the fee stand at \$1,986, meaning the city will recover only 10 percent of the costs.

Factors like staff time and outside consultation influence the final application costs.

"What we found is that when you're doing research on historic properties, it can be very time consuming because there's not a good catalogue of information on historic properties, a lot of these are not indexed," said City Planner/Assistant Director of Community Development Ryan Gohlich.

Councilmember Willie Brien recommended hiking up the Tier 2 and Tier 3 costs to \$1,000 and \$5,000.

The historic preservation ordinance was originally approved by the City Council on January 25, 2012.

Hacker attends education conference

Joining a few hundred other elected officials from across state, newly sworn-in Board of Education member Isabel Hacker attended the California School Boards Association's (CSBA) annual Education Conference and Trade Show last week.

"According to information given at the conference, there is more funding for education in the next five years," Hacker said. "That was something that they shared."

Held at the San Diego Convention Center, the three-day event featured workshops on a wide variety of topics, from disability-based discrimination to technology policies.

"I think it's important we go as a team next year, because all the other districts had teams there, and I think that would be great," Hacker said.

Howard Goldstein talks Measure E, election results and his goals as incoming Board of Education President

How do you interpret the Board of Education election results?

Well, clearly the community was looking for change at a certain level. By not [re]electing Mr. [Lewis] Hall, the community was looking for a slightly different path. I believe that the community is looking for positive leadership—which is something that I had advocated for when I ran. When you really look at it, Dr. [Brian] Goldberg was not running for a seat [and] Mr. [Noah] Margo was reelected to a second term—so clearly the community was pleased with his service on the Board. I look forward to working with a Board that is professional and guided by the depth of our responsibility in our common role to lead this district forward.

You supported incumbent member Noah Margo, who placed third. If voters were happy with the Board, why didn't Noah place first?

Quite frankly, I didn't see the community throwing the proverbial baby out with the bathwater. They clearly wanted a change of direction with respect to leadership and bringing in the experience of Mr. [Mel] Spitz, who has previously been on the school board, and bringing a new lens with respect to Mrs. [Isabel] Hacker. I would suppose that the community looked at the individuals running and made a determination that the elected composition of the new Board would be something that would be beneficial to both this district and the community.

Do you think the outcome was a rebuke of the Board?

I think it's a difficult position to say that it was a rebuke of the Board, because clearly Dr. Goldberg was not running this time and Mr. Hall was and they brought back Mr. Margo. If you really look at what changed on the Board without Dr. Goldberg running, the only change to the Board was Mr. Hall. So if the community was looking for a wholesale change of the Board, I don't think Mr. Margo would have been reelected.

School-age parents comprise a small number of the total electorate in Board of Education races. Why do you think school-age parents don't take a more active role in voting in local elections?

It's unfortunate that it appears that those with children currently within the BHUSD

do not seem to vote at great numbers in our school board elections. I think that over the last two decades there may be a sense of disconnect between parents and the leadership at the school sites, which has translated

to a disconnect with the Board. One of my main goals when I ran for this position was to foster positive leadership. In my first year on the Board, it became evident to me that leadership was lacking at many levels throughout the district. It is my experience that school leadership is second only to teacher quality in terms of importance for student achievement. So, to me, the importance of achievement at all levels of the district cannot be overstated. Over the years, I have consistently emphasized the importance of school leadership and improving outcomes for our schools and its students. Increasing our educational leadership has really been paramount for me while sitting on the Board. I believe that parents will become further engaged with their school sites and the district as administrators throughout the district are demonstrating leadership qualities that are unique to the school sites.

The Board is often criticized for spending millions on legal fees on unsuccessful lawsuits. What's your plan for curbing these expenditures?

As a former member of the Citizens' Oversight Committee, I saw firsthand the expenditures that the district was facilitating on our legal matters. As a Board member, I immediately advocated for a general counsel for the district to review all our legal expenditures to bring them in line with other school districts. We were making some headway by reducing the amount of expenditures over the last two years from the first five years that the bond had passed. I made it a priority to ensure that when this current Board is seated, that the majority of the legal matters were put behind us and we can focus on academic achievement. The reality is that the vast majority of litigation started

prior to me being on the Board two years ago. I did make it a priority to curtail the amount of legal expenditures that we were spending on our attorneys and counsel, and I think we've had some success in doing that. The majority of the litigation is running its course; fortunately, we're left with just a few items. It was a goal of mine to see that these matters come to conclusion as quickly as possible so we can get back to focusing on the business of the district as it applies to our students and academic achievement.

Why should voters approve a new bond measure in 2016?

Having sat on the Horace Mann Facilities Committee from 2008 to 2010, it became abundantly clear throughout the district that the facilities are 85 to 100 years old and in need of updating and upgrading to become 21st-century learning environments.

The reality is that the community should wait and see how well we manage the Horace Mann construction project—that's really the linchpin of our construction program. Currently, the Horace Mann construction project is approximately 70-percent complete; the completion date is in spring 2016. And it's on time and on budget, and that's important. It's important that, as a district, we can facilitate construction and manage it well. I will be advocating that this Board goes out and seeks to take a new bond—whether a replacement bond or a new bond—to the voters of Beverly Hills in June or November of 2016.

But you understand why many voters are reluctant to trust the Board with construction plans?

If history holds, this community has always supported the district construction program providing the necessary funds for a bond. I think there has been a disconnect with regard to the district providing information as to the construction plan moving forward. The district has held numerous—and I've attended dozens—of study sessions and facilities meetings and Citizens' Oversight Committee meetings where construction was discussed. Those were all public meetings where the plans were vetted out with certain parts of the community. I believe that the construction plans are solid, but the issue became the phasing of the construction plans, given the limited resources of the [Measure E] bond.

Will you vote to accelerate the full amount of the bond?

My goal was always to take the planning stage to this point where the new Board could sit down and make some decision as to what this district would

look like moving forward from a facilities standpoint. I have asked Superintendent Steve Kessler to schedule a study session with regard to the construction, to give the new Board members an update on the facilities program. And then, on December 15, the Board will discuss the options available to us moving forward. Depending on what the Board decides as to the current projects or the next projects, we'll make a determination as to the necessity of accessing the combined assessment and having a discussion about a new or replacement bond.

Tell us about your family.

I'm grateful for my wife Juliet, who's an elementary school teacher, and of course my sons Gabe and Ian. Gabe is in 11th grade at [Beverly High] and Ian is in 7th grade at Horace Mann. I'm grateful for the sacrifices they make each and every day that have enabled me to volunteer my time to this district for the past 15 years. My wife's passion and dedication to teaching inspired me to become engaged in public education.

Will you support Noah Margo for vice president?

The bylaws, as I've read them, are essentially a hybrid. What I mean by that is it reads both as a rotation process and a nomination-and-a-vote process, so it calls for both a rotation and a nomination and a vote. As I read the bylaws, it indicates that the longest serving member of the Board would be next in the rotation for vice president. To me, that would be the honorable Mel Spitz, who has nine years of Board service. The bylaws do not [distinguish between] concurrent or continuous, where other paragraphs of the bylaws do specifically talk about time frame. Because there's no indication of time frame, Mr. Spitz would be next in the nomination. And there is a difference between a nomination and obtaining three votes for the any of the officer positions. So the rotation of nomination as I see it would be Mr. Spitz, Mrs. [Lisa] Korbatov, Mr. Margo and Mrs. Hacker. Of course, the individual that gets at least three votes would become the vice president. In that sense, the nomination doesn't automatically mean that you will assume the officer position—that requires the vote of the Board majority.

What would you like to have accomplished one year from now?

I think my overall goal for the district has not really changed since I first took office. It's my goal that the district strives to make Beverly Hills schools more appealing to Beverly Hills families.

In that regard, we must implement a strategic plan that highlights an academically stimulating environment with multiple pathways for student success. A year from now, when I look back at the capstone of my presidency, it will be that this Board re-imagines quality education, restores best practices and reestablishes transparency to this district.
